### DAR Awards Historic Preservation Grant for the Muller House Museum

The National Society Daughters of the American Revolution announced in May that they will donate \$4,485 to help cover expenses for much-needed preservation work at the Muller House Museum. Funding for this project was made possible through the sponsorship of the Point Vicente Chapter, National Society Daughters of the American Revolution, of the Palos Verdes Peninsula.

If you have visited the museum recently, you may have noticed the toll that time and the coastal weather have taken on the front porch, particularly the flooring, newel posts and balustrade. The grant will address the preservation of the porch area as well as the historic stick flagpole from the E. K. Wood Lumber Company in the front yard, plus two spots of the under-flooring inside the house.

We feel very fortunate that they have chosen to assist us in these preservation efforts. We would like to thank particularly Paula Hawkins, Regent of the Point Vicente Chapter; Karin Amour, District XIII Director and State Chair, Public Relations and Media; and Society member Terry Bergman, also of the Point Vicente Chapter, who first brought the grant opportunity to our attention.

The DAR grants program was started in 2010. Funding is awarded to support projects in local communities which promote the organization's mission areas of historic preservation, education, and patriotism. Hundreds of grants applications are received each year, making competition high. Groups applying must be sponsored by a local DAR chapter, and the Point Vicente Chapter provided valuable guidance and wrote an enthusiastic letter of support.

The National Society Daughters of the American Revolution was founded in 1890 to promote patriotism, preserve American history, and support better education for the nation's children. Its members are descended from patriots who won American independence during the Revolutionary War. It has over 185,000 members in approximately 3,000 chapters worldwide, making it one of the world's largest and most active service organizations.

A sampling of the awards made in the category of historic preservation reflect a broad concern with historically significant records, artifacts, and architecture.

For the Cow Neck Peninsula Historical Society (NY): headstone restoration; The Speaker's House (PA): kitchen restoration; Bluffton Historical Preservation Society (PA): digitize genealogical files and storage; Cumberland University (TN): restoration of portraits; Bartholomew County Historical Society (IN): farmhouse windows restoration. Our application was the only one awarded in California in the category, so we are indeed pleased.

# San Pedro Gets Married: Wedding Attire at the Muller House Museum

For the traditional wedding season, Kara McLeod and Toni Martinovich have set up a display of wedding attire that has a San Pedro connection: two bridal gowns, a bridesmaid's dress, a mother-of-the-bride ensemble, and some trousseau items. One bridal gown dates from the 1939 wedding of Lillian Larson and Karl (Brud) Peterson, who was an owner of the former Peterson's Market at Weymouth Corners (now Pirozzi's Italian Deli). Reporting on the Peterson wedding, the News-Pilot said of the bride, "She wore a princess style gown of white satin, fashioned en train. Her long veil fell from a coronet of orange blossoms. She carried lilies of the valley and orchids."

A second gown, donated by Judith Webb, dates from the late 1950s and has the distinction of being worn by four different brides, including Judith. The 1939 attire will be displayed downstairs at the Muller House, and the 1950s gown upstairs.

### **March Quilt Show**

Equipped with a vintage Singer Featherweight, expert quilter Julie Sawyer (shown in photo below) demonstrated piecing techniques in the Muller House living room on both show Sundays. She brought examples of old patterned flour sacks, which women would use as a source of quilt fabric, and also her mother's 80-year old baby quilt, backed with a feed sack. Visible in the photo of Julie is Carol Larsen Harshaw's quilt, made in honor of her daughter, Tiffiny, who served in the U.S. Navy from 1989 – 1993. Carol supplied her with blank muslin squares on which Tiffiny wrote accounts of her navy experiences every Friday for two years. Carol then pieced these squares with patterned fabric frames and included at the top a panel of miniature American flags, creating a diary quilt of her daughter's service.

Others showing quilts were Joe and Martha McKinzie. Joe's mother's charming "Ride 'Em Cowboy," created for the young McKinzie, was another featured item. Andrea Luse Anderson showed off her mother's work, including a baby quilt made for her brother, our current secretary Frank Anderson. Mona Dallas Reddick brought her grandmother Victoria's 90-year old red-and-white bear-claw patterned quilt and an appliqué quilt top of Americana and nautical motifs made by San Pedro commercial artist Helen G. Kane, between 1933 and 1936.

### In Memory of Nan Roberts

We are sad to report that Nancy "Nan" L. Roberts passed away on May 8, 2019. A few of her many contributions to the SPBHS are highlighted here. The *Daily Breeze* published an obituary May 24.

Nan was one of the important figures in the creation of the Muller House Museum. After the

house was relocated to its present site, she worked alongside husband Bill Roberts and others on the interior restoration. Bill's Shoreline article of June 1997 tells of reaching a certain point in the progress: "It was about this time that the interior paint crew moved in. The crew consisted of my wife, Nan. She had the doubtful privilege of scrubbing walls and

woodwork, scraping countless layers of paint from doors and trim . . . . [all this] needed to be done before she could even think of applying the necessary coats of paint."

In addition to her splendid work as a painter, Nan donated furniture and artifacts, collaborating with the interior committee to establish a "look" for the house representative of a prosperous middle-class family of early twentieth-century San Pedro. As the house was readied for the public, she wrote "The Muller House Docent Handbook" and continued to advise volunteers on house matters for many years. For the old SPBHS bulletin, she penned articles written in the voice of a personified Muller House which eagerly awaited "her" guests and enjoyed the attentions of the volunteers. She often led special house tours for school children and

### **Other Passings**

Sadly, other San Pedro members and friends left us this spring. Well-known and much-loved Kuzma "Matty" Domancich passed away May 18. He was devoted to the town, its residents, and



supported many civic and social organizations, particularly the San Pedro Elks Lodge. The half-tone picture at the left comes from a 1944 Todd Shipyard employee newsletter in the Archives. It shows a very young Matty shortly after he enlisted in the U. S. Navy during World War II.

Matty was laid to rest at Green Hills Memorial Park on May 28, after a funeral Mass at Mary Star of the Sea Church. For a fuller account of his life, please see the online version of the obituary in the *Daily Breeze*.

Ann Gusha of Williams' Book Store passed away in May. Son Jerry Gusha reports that at this time arrangements have not been finalized. Ann was born to Croatian parents in the Seattle area but grew up here, where she raised three children and entered the book business as an employee of Williams' Book Store in 1941. In 1980, with Jerry, she purchased the store and was a constant presence almost until its closing in 2013. How many fondly remember stopping by for a quick visit whenever we were downtown!

### Harvard and CSULB Students Visit the Archives

In March, Harvard University students spent an afternoon examining records and photos in the Archives. Funded by the university, they were carrying out field research in San Pedro and Wilmington as part of a course that explores how these areas have developed. Their goal, they explained, is "to expose what underlying forces shape . . . cultural identities and conflicts" here.

Then in April, a series of California State University Long Beach students visited in pursuit of historical San Pedro buildings and sites, a kind of scavenger hunt assigned in their "Human Geography" class. Archives staff helped them with historical facts and the layout of the town.
